# RI PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

# October 2022

n August, I was proud to visit Pakistan and highlight Rotary's top goal, eradicating polio. It was also a tremendous opportunity to spotlight female health workers who are playing a critical role in protecting children from this vaccine-preventable disease.

This month, as we celebrate World Polio Day, We are shining a spotlight on our more than 30-year effort to lead the first global polio eradication campaign and our success in forming partnerships capable of completing this massive goal. We all know that this is one of the most ambitious global health initiatives in history and that we've reduced polio cases by more than 99.9 percent worldwide.

Pakistan is one of only two countries in the world where wild poliovirus remains endemic. (The other one is neighboring Afghanistan.)

"I was able to witness and take part in vaccination campaigns in Pakistan, and soon after I left, a monumental nationwide immunization campaign took place, focused on 43 million children under the age of 5."

I saw the incredible work of Rotary members on the ground. More than 60 percent of vaccinators in Pakistan are women, and they are doing a remarkable job building trust and convincing mothers to vaccinate their children.

Seeing it all first hand, I know that the will exists across the Rotary world to end polio, and I'm confident that we have the strategy. The Pakistani media has been very supportive of our efforts as well, and this is making a difference. This month, a new global pledging moment at the World Health Summit in Berlin promises to pull together more resources to fund these timesensitive eradication efforts. Now it is up to us to do our part and raise

\$50 million this year to earn the full 2-to-I match from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation.

There's great cause for optimism on the polio front — but also some staggering new events that have further raised the stakes. Over the past few months, new polio outbreaks have occurred in Israel, the United Kingdom and, most recently, in the New York City area. These stories are frightening, but in every case, the response is clear — vaccines work, and if polio is spreading, we need to make sure the most atrisk people have kept their vaccinations up to date.

"Most importantly, we need to eradicate this virus now. If polio exists anywhere, it can spread everywhere. What I saw in Pakistan convinced me that we can and must finish the job, but it will only happen if we remain committed to a strategy that's working and back it with all necessary resources."

Through our commitment, generosity, and sheer determination, we will #EndPolio.

# **GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE**

October 2022

The Month of October is Community and Economic Development Month in the Rotary International Calendar.

"I am so happy to report that in all the eighty (80) Rotary Clubs that I have visited since the start of our Imaginative Rotary Journey, all of them have very significant, high impact projects dedicated to the Area of Focus - Community and Economic Development."

A variety of livelihood projects implemented by the Clubs in our District are highlighted as follows:

- Meat Processing Lessons for Longganiza, Tocino, Siomai, and Lumpia-Small Scale Businesses;
- Breadmaking Business with provisions for basic baking equipment;

 Donation of Sewing Machines for community use for various recycling projects;

- Recycling of Tarpaulins into decorative bags;
- Creative Lessons for Christmas Decors and Actual Sale of Décor Items;
- Candle Making;
- Pattern Making and Sewing Lessons for Housewives;
- Basic Gardening of Vegetables in Containers;
- Hydrophonics and Aquaculture;
- Preparation of Liquid Dishwashing Solutions and Fabric Softeners; and
- Recycling of Newspapers into Decorative Bags.

The long term Community and Economic Development Projects which have been institutionalized as flagship projects in our District 3800 are the following:

A. The <u>LUXID Foundation of the Rotary Club of Pasig</u>
which has a total capitalization of Two Million Pesos
(P2M) funded by Rotarians, and with a total membership



of close to three hundred (300) residents of the adopted communities of the Rotary Club of Pasig. This Foundation grants a variety of low interest loans to its members who otherwise do not have access to banks and other financial institutions payable on easy payment terms. The LUXID Foundation has been operating for more than five (5) years already, and has helped in stimulating economic development of their adopted communities as the loan beneficiaries are able to engage in small scale businesses to augment their family income.

B. The Pasig South Credit Cooperative was established primarily for the benefit of the teachers of the adopted school of the Rotary Club of Pasig South, the Buting Elementary School, five (5) years ago, and has since expanded to include the teachers of three (3) other public schools in Pasig City. Membership in the Credit Cooperative has since increased to more than a hundred teachers with a capitalization base of more than One Million Pesos (PIM). Loan amounts from a minimum of Ten Thousand Pesos to One Hundred Thousand Pesos (P10,000-P100,000). The Credit Cooperative will soon be upgraded to a Multi-purpose Credit Cooperative and will be granted an extension of its geographic base to include Makati, Mandaluyong, San Juan, and Taguig Cities.

"In all my visits to our Rotary Clubs, emphasis has been given not only to devoting all humanitarian service projects to the Rotary Foundation's seven (7) areas of focus but have included a campaign as part of the Empowering Women Initiative to provide livelihood projects to women in the club's adopted communities."

   to be discussed by Past District Governor Anthony N.


   Paruñgao of the Rotary Club of Marikina North and current District Membership Chair;

# The 2022 District 3800 Bowling Tourney

There was total silence as more than five hundred Rotarians and guests are on their feet, eyes riveted on the anchor bowler as he/she prepared to roll the deciding ball of the tournament. The goal: All pins still standing must fall!

It seemed that it took an eternity for the ball to hit the pins but when it did, the crowd erupted into a roar, hands clapping, feet stomping frenzy. But suddenly, all fell dead silent, eyes wide in utter disbelief at what they saw! Then, as reality sunk in, they gave a thundering outburst of approval as the two anchor bowlers hugged, and raised each other's hands in a gesture of unconditional sportsmanship, a stirring testament to the reality that: In Rotary, there are no losers, all are winners!

The above encapsulates the essence of this annual and very popular District event then postponed for two years due to Covid-19 protocols. As the opening attendance proved, it is a very welcome breaker to Rotary's Service to Humanity demands. While only thirty out (37) out of the one hundred seven (107) Rotary Clubs in the District participated, such is not due to non-interest but to venue limitations. Notably, the Sta. Lucia Bowling Lanes, the country's biggest, can only accommodate bowlers from thirty (30) clubs.

At stake was the prestigious Governor's Cup, the District Secretary's Cup, the Assistant Governor's Cup and the President's Cup for the Team Competitions. Winning Teams received cash prizes and trophies (P8k, P6k, P4k, and P2k, respectively). Eligible teams for each category vied for their respective titles on November 27, 2022 as the main event of this Tournament followed by the awarding of prizes/trophies in the closing ceremonies.

The Individual Competitions, indisputably the most popular in the world of Ten-Pin Bowling, will be held on November 20, 2022 which will feature the best Rotarian bowlers as they vied for the most coveted champion titles for the Men's Master (P2k + trophy), Men's Graded Master (P1.5k + trophy) and Men's Associate (P1k + trophy) categories. Women bowlers vie for the Women's Graded Master (P1.5k + trophy) and Women's Associate Master





(P1k + trophy) categories. All 1st and 2<sup>nd</sup> Runner Ups for all categories are to be awarded trophies.

# World Polio Day 2022 Successfully celebrated in RI District 3800

On World Polio Day, the Rotary International (RI) District 3800 and the Rotaract Club District 3800 urged all parents to vaccinate their children against preventable diseases, especially polio. Hosted by the Rotary Club of Valle Verde, RI District 3800 and the Rotaract Club District 3800 celebrated the World Polio Day with an End Polio Now Campaign on October 23, 2022 at the Marikina Sports Complex, Marikina City.



The event was highlighted by the walk for a cause participated in by the Rotarians and Rotaractors from the eight (8) zones of RI District 3800 followed by the live performances of the Bobby Tanyag Singers (BTS) and the kids who were previously the recipients of polio vaccines. The human logo formation of "END POLIO NOW" culminated the event. The event was flocked by close to 600 participants.





This activity was part of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative meant to help raise both funds and awareness against the disease. Rotary International, a core partner in the Initiative, has raised more than \$2 billion and used countless volunteer hours to help protect nearly three billion children in 122 countries.

In June 2021, the Philippines announced the closure of the polio outbreak in the country following eighteen (18) months of outbreak response which vaccinated over eleven million (11M) children, many of whom received polio drops during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Polio is a highly infectious, crippling, and sometimes fatal disease that can be avoided through a vaccine. Children under the age of five are most vulnerable to contracting polio.

With Project Tanglaw, 80 homes were given solar lights, a more affordable, more accessible, and safer alternative to electric-powered and conventional lights. In this way, the Rotary Club of Valenzuela hopes to light the way of the families in making sure that their nights are safer and their future is a whole light brighter.



IATP Rhoel shares this thought: "When we experience blackouts in the cities for few minutes, we get so happy when the lights are finally restored. What more to the people of Rosario who never had light at night before?"

# RC VALENZUELA SUNRISE'S ADOPTED COMMUNITY IN ZAMBALES

It has long been our dream to adopt a community and contribute to the betterment of their well-being through our series of projects. This started last July 30, 2022 when we partially delivered some of our donations to the Aningway Sacatihan Elementary School and High School in Zambales. Upon our initial visit, we were able to see how the community was doing amidst the challenges posed by the pandemic. Unfortunately, their schools have damaged classrooms, incomplete learning materials, and limited spaces to conduct classes. To alleviate the plight of the community, we donated chairs, whiteboards, television sets, and other learning materials during our initial visit last July 30, 2022. After our initial visit, we decided to meet as a group to better determine what we should donate and how we could help the community we chose to adopt.



Indeed, it is a tiring yet very blissful journey – adopting a community and helping them get back up on their feet. There were so many things we wanted to do, and we decided to take them step by step.

Upon our return to the community last August 4, 2022, we executed the initial phase of our plan: to donate necessities to both the school and the community. First, we provided food packs to 160 families along with toys, clothes, and some goodies for the kids. The smiles on their faces as they received our gift showed us just how impactful our actions were. From merely imagining a better life, we were now helping them actualize it through

our own little way. Our food pack contained rice grains, powdered milk, noodles, and other important goods.



We also noted that food sufficiency of the community is an important aspect we should focus on. So, in our second visit, we gave out 1,000 different vegetable plants to Sitio-Gala Zambales for the families to plant around the community. Through this, they could sell the crops to earn money or use the crops as their food for everyday living. These plants will help them provide a source of living and nutritious foods.





Following the community projects, we also have schoolfocused projects specifically for the students. Our club donated a Rotary Club of Valenzuela Sunrise PE uniform to 200 students belonging to the Aningway Sacatihan Elementary School and High School. This is to help promote the Rotary branding alongside providing proper clothing and other necessities to the children. With this gift, they will be able to have a proper uniform to use for their physical education classes. Alongside this, we also donated bags and school supplies to the children. Education is vital in a country – the children are our future, and it is up to us to ensure that they have a suitable learning environment for them to be the best that they can be. We should never get tired of doing little things for others as it is often these little things that make the biggest difference in their lives.
