Introducing the Rotary Youth Network

How do you take the best from the worst?

None of us will forget how the pandemic altered our world and our lives. Each of us had to traverse this period of uncertainty, and no one had a free pass from the effects.

I personally believe this has created space for a different kind of global leadership — one that is courageous, empathetic, and vulnerable. I met my good friend Anniela Carracedo online in early 2020. She is one such leader, and I'm thrilled to turn this month's column over to her.

In March 2020, I had a panic attack. I couldn't breathe, and I felt a terrible pain in my chest.

It had been a few days since the World Health Organization declared COVID-19 a global pandemic, and I was in the middle of my year as a Rotary Youth Exchange student in the United States. Think about it:

an 18-year-old girl stuck in a different country, with a foreign language, with people she had only met six months before. It was scary.

But I am familiar with uncertainty. I was born and raised in Venezuela, which is going through one of the worst humanitarian and political crises in the Western Hemisphere. But my mom always said, "Challenges are nothing more than needs that require a solution."

I called up my Interact and Youth Exchange friends. Together, we organized an online meeting to share projects and get inspired by what everyone else was doing during the quarantine. In that first meeting, we had 70 people, mainly students, from 17 countries.

From that beginning, we built an online platform for Rotary youths worldwide to share their experiences and inspire others with project ideas during isolation. We looked for mentors and supporters who would help our group connect young people, share cultures, and open new collaborative opportunities for international service projects. We called it Rotary Interactive Quarantine, or RIQ.

After only a year, we engaged with more than 5,000 students from 80 countries. Several of our team members became district Interact representatives and district committee members, and some of us even serve on Rotary International councils.

Eventually, quarantine restrictions were being lifted, and the needs of our participants were changing. At our last official meeting as RIQ, Past RI President Barry Rassin inspired us to create even bigger change, so we transformed RIQ into the Rotary Youth Network, or RYN.

A few of our members, including me, were selected to serve on the inaugural Interact Advisory Council, where we presented our vision for youth in Rotary to the RI Board of Directors.

Our presentation to the Board inspired President Jennifer and her team to create a Youth Advisory Council in Rotary International, which I am honored to serve on as a co-chair.

The Rotary Youth Network officially launched during a breakout session at the 2022 Rotary International Convention in Houston. Five of us, who had participated in Interact, Youth Exchange, and Rotary Youth Leadership Awards, traveled across continents to launch an organization we had kicked off online two years before. The convention was also the first time we had met in person.

When my friends and I finished our talk, we realized more than 500 people were giving us a standing ovation. Tears filled our eyes, and the feeling of excitement and accomplishment took over.

Who would have thought that a panic attack would lead to this?

GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE

My Greetings to all of our Rotarians in District 3800!

All our clubs are mandated to empower communities to access grants and other resources, embrace local solutions, and constantly innovate in all efforts to help retard environmental degradation.

We, Rotarians understand that the whole World is our backyard, and must constantly safeguard our environment and this is everyone's ultimate mission.

We not only do lip service to this particular mission, we are all deeply involved and are committed to the basic requisites; we all plant thousands of trees. We have cultivated mangroves to protect our foreshores and provide a sanctuary for marine life, cultivate bamboos, plant giant bamboos along our rivers to mitigate flooding, help keep our waterways clean, and harness our communities to raise awareness to be part of the global initiative to preserve our Mother Earth.

But a deeper and more meaningful approach to really make a difference in our world is for all of us Rotarians to rally everyone to help in the drastic initiative of reducing global warming, and be more conscious of the catastrophic changes to the world we live in brought about by climate change. The disastrous typhoons and hurricanes which have devastated vast areas around the world, our traumatic experience with catastrophic floodings and thousands of lives lost annually with Typhoon "Ondoy", Typhoon "Yolanda", Typhoon "Ulysses", and the unusually lengthy monsoon rains, and the rising sea levels need a concerted approach by all Rotarians around the globe, all 1.4 million Rotarians- strong to help raise and lead all efforts to bring down seawater temperature levels to help mitigate climate change.

We must all rally and create a string voice to influence our nation's leaders and captains of industry to be more conscious of each and everyone's contribution to bringing down sea water temperatures and help arrest climate change through a concerted voice and effort for everyone to be aware of how we can mitigate climate change through incessant information campaigns on the following:

A. How each one of us can help reduce each one's Carbon Footprint through the reduction of each one's use of



energy from fossil fuels whose combustion continuously generate Carbon Dioxide, and Carbon Monoxide which continuously damage the earth's Ozone Layer. Any reduction in our individual Carbon footprint will contribute to arresting global warming.

- B. All Rotarians should conduct information drives in schools and communities to kick-off the global effort to reduce global warming.

As a start, I personally have harnessed solar cells to generate electricity, provide alternative lighting in my household, and helped distribute saltwater lamps to far flung communities to provide alternative lighting, and donated solar lamps to communities without electricity.

And, I raise this plea for all of us to help reduce our own individual carbon footprints, reduce our dependence on energy from fossil fuels, for this is the most effective way to contribute to the global effort to prevent climate change, and preserve our Legacy, our World, our Environment!



The result of community consultations and months of planning was Rotary Vax Drive, an anti-pneumonia vaccination campaign which aims to provide the needed vaccines to the financially challenged residents Municipality of Tuy, Batangas.

Rotary Vax Drive is Zone 7's effort and advocacy to address the current needs of the underprivileged sectors in its adopted communities aimed at improving health and preventing diseases. The first leg of the campaign was held last August 13, 2022 in San Juan

between Service and City wherein a total of 230 underprivileged residents Bureau of Fire Protection pneumonia vaccines. In addition to about 15 volunteer Zone 7 Rotarians who travelled from Manila to assist in the campaign, the project was supported locally by the Municipal Government of Tuy, the Provincial Government of Batangas and the Department of Health (DOH) which also utilized the venue to provide other health-related services to their constituents. In both legs of the campaign, the most vulnerable such as the elderly, people with comorbidity, children and mothers, were prioritized.



SPORTS FOR HOPE, LEARN IT & ARUGA: RCGH'S Flagship Service Projects

For this Rotary Year, the Rotary Club of Greenhills (RCGH) conducted its three (3) flagship service projects designed to inspire, educate and nurture the residents of the communities they serve. These projects are Sports for Hope, LEARN IT and Aruga which cover Rotary's Areas of Focus of Peace Building and Conflict Resolution, Basic Education and Literacy and Saving Mothers and Children.

Sports for Hope project was conducted on November 22, 2022 at the Camp Bagong Diwa, Bicutan, Taguig City. In partnership with Toby's Youth Sports Foundation, this annual project aims to assist the facility's rehabilitation efforts through the promotion of sports as an avenue to improve the patients' wellbeing as they try to reintegrate into the society as fully rehabilitated and reformed individuals. This year's activity under this project featured a volleyball and basketball clinic facilitated by Toby's Youth Foundation and their student-athlete interns from the University of Sto. Tomas designed to develop the value of health, fitness and mental wellness as a key rehab intervention and a potent tool in drug prevention. RCGH also invited sports personalities to further inspire the patients.

On the other hand, the LEARN IT project is a partnership of RCGH with Poweredge and Infosoft and focuses on the training and education of elementary students to advance their knowledge of the IT world. It is the vision of the program to foster future IT Engineers and software experts by laying down the foundations of IT learning and inspire the students. The LEARN IT hands on trainings program conducted at the Nicano Ibuna Elementary School in San Juan City also included donations of complete computer sets and printers donated by the RCGH.

Lastly, Project Aruga is a medical mission for mothers

and children with included post maternal and pediatric check-up which was conducted last Sept 13, 2022 in Pasig City. RCGH also conducted psychological talk and mother care seminar for mothers who were victims of rape and abuse.





THIS IS WHY WE JOINED ROTARY

For this Rotary Year, the Rotary Club of San Juan North (RCSJN) adopted a barrio as we envisioned to have a long-lasting positive impact to the community. We chose Barrio Dalima, Tuy, Batangas, a poor community whose economy used to depend on its dry fields for sugarcane production. Given tough competition from imported sugar and outdated farming practices, the "central" in the area closed down, thus, devastating the livelihood of the residents in the area.

After months of preparation, studies, fund raising projects, internal planning, and coordination with the locals, we finally launched the seven (7) projects last April I, 2023 aptly titled the 7 Magnanimous Service Projects of the RCSJN. The event was attended by barrio officials, medical volunteers, residents, and several Rotarians from RCSJN.

The projects that were meant to address the needs of the club's adopted community and aligned to Rotary International's areas of focus are, as follows:

- Tanglaw Ang Ngiti RCSJN conducted a dental mission in partnership with the dentists and assistants of Empire Dental meant to provide dental procedures to 160 residents. RCSJN also provided toothpastes and polident adhesive gels to the children;
- 2. **Tanglaw Ng Kagitingan** RCSJN enhanced the Barangay Tanods' capabilities to enforce safety and security of the barrio by providing them with raincoats, boots, batons and flashlights;
- 3. Tanglaw Para Kay Inay RCSJN enabled the elderly women by providing two (2) wheelchairs to the Barangay Health Center;
- 4. **Tanglaw Para Sa Kaligtasan -** RCSJN improved the sanitary condition of four (4) elementary schools and the senior high school of Tuy by providing them *lavabos* where the students can

- properly wash their hands. We also donated facemasks, alcohol and a disinfectant spray machine to the Barangay Health Center for proper disinfection of the public facilities;
- **5. Tanglaw Para Sa Kalikasan -** RCSJN spearheaded a clean-up drive in the barangay roads and installed signages to promote cleanliness;
- 6. Tanglaw ng Katalinuhan a feeding program for sixty (60) elementary students of Dalima Elementary School. RCSJN gave them McDonalds toys; and
- 7. Tanglaw ng Kabuhayan (Magkambing Ay Di Biro) a goat-raising livelihood initiative which serves as RCSJN's flagship project this Rotary Year. RCSJN used the traditional "pa iwi" system where seven (7) does (female goats) were delivered to chosen residents who are tasked to take care of the animals to produce offsprings (baby goats). All proceeds from this "pa iwi" system shall be shared equally by the community. RCSJN intends to expand and sustain this project for the coming years by using the proceeds to purchase more does.

Through these 7 Magnanimous Service Projects, we were all reminded of why we Rotarians do what we do. This is Rotary! We are the proud Rotarians of San Juan North!







"MAKINA NI INA" – Self-Sustaining Livelihood Project for Solo Parents

The Philippines' solo/single parents are approximately 13.64% of the nation's 110 million population as reported by the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD). Their predicament includes being hampered in domestic chores, manifold role as a mother and father to a child, and the need to earn double or additional income to augment for the needs of the child. In San Juan City alone, solo/single parents need a benefit that will be able to ease some of their worries, one of which is the availability of daily earnings in a steady homebased livelihood.

The Rotary Club of San Juan West (RCSJW), District 3800–Philippines, and the Rotary Club of Kasukabe West (RCKW), District 2770–Japan, jointly responded to the call of these marginal members of our society through the World Community Service Project called "Makina ni Ina."

Ten (10) units of brand-new JUKI Industrial sewing machines were turned over to four (4) barangays (Brgy. Onse, Brgy. Salapan, Brgy. Batis and Brgy. Corazon de Jesus) and to the RCC SJW PWD Association on January 23, 2023. The turnover was led by IATP Roselle Suan, together with the members of the Makina Committee. The solo parents were subjected to a 5-day Dressmaking Skills Training-Seminar at TESDA-San Juan City before they were allowed to start producing different products out of the scraps of fabrics that we provided them so that they can start their production.

Last April 18, 2023, the RCSJW and RCKW conducted a project site visit wherein the recipients showcased the different products that they made such as rags, potholders, aprons, pillows, pillowcases, bedsheets, etc.

Indeed, this project's goal to provide a long-term and sustainable source of income for the solo parents of San Juan City is now starting to come into fruition.























Celebrating International Women's Day 2023: Highlights the Power of Technology in Empowering Women
