

Message

If we are to truly change the world with The Magic of Rotary, it's up to all of us to foster a sense of belonging in our clubs. But every club should take its own path to get there, and the Action Plan can help you find your way. What does that look like?

Take for instance the Rotary Club of Beveren-Waas in Belgium. It was chartered in 1974 but has evolved with the times, developing both a strategic plan and a membership plan. To find new members, the club analyzes the city's professions to help focus its search, and all new members are quickly assigned tasks and roles.

The club also mixes up meeting times, alternating between evening and afternoon sessions, making them accessible for all members.

Sometimes, circumstances force clubs to make changes. But as people of action, we know that behind every obstacle is an opportunity.

The Rotary Club of Holyoke in Massachusetts was forced from its meeting place because of rising costs after the COVID-19 pandemic, but members took this setback and turned it into a strength. The club started meeting in a library community room that was available for no charge and catering lunch from a nearby deli. Lunch costs \$10 per person but it's optional, so no one has to spend money to attend a meeting. What a great way to work toward being "fair to all concerned."

Since making this change, the Holyoke club has gained 13 members. I suspect part of its membership growth is due to the club's sense of inclusivity – the first step toward belonging.

If you ask members what they expect from the club experience, you might find that your club doesn't meet expectations. Think of this as an opportunity to reshape your club in exciting ways, as alternative club models are making a positive impact.

For example, a Rotary Fellowship called Beers Rotarians Enjoy Worldwide, or BREW, has worked closely with the Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene Rotary Action Group for the past eight years to assist with clean water projects. In that time, BREW has funneled 25 percent of its dues to those initiatives.

BREW is one of many examples of members pursuing belonging to improve the world. I can't stress enough the importance of belonging. Clubs become simply irresistible when all members feel that they are exactly where they need to be. To me, belonging is the spark that ignites The Magic of Rotary.

As you receive feedback from club members and the community you serve, I urge you to pursue that spark. The Action Plan can help you find the path to success, and if you light your way with the spirit of belonging, that path will lead to a bright future for your club, your community, and the world.



On July 14, 2024, our club, the Rotary Club of San Mateo Highlands (RCSMH), did a groundbreaking initiative in our community in Barangay Silangan, San Mateo, Rizal. This is our 6-in-1 health service project for the whole family dubbed as "Kalusugan Para sa Buong Pamilya Alay ng Highlands," which is a comprehensive endeavor aimed at enhancing the well-being of every member of the family. Done on a Sunday which is considered a Family Day, this transformative and impactful project, designed to address multiple aspects of family health and wellness, has left an indelible mark on the lives of our beneficiaries in our local community.

DZRH was our media partner. Reporter Mae Binauhan, in her segment "Public Service Hour," did a live coverage highlighting the actual conduct of the project. Prior to that, specifically on 10 July 2024, we had a live radio-TV guesting at the DZRH station hosted by Ms. Binauhan to promote the project. RCSMH is considered a partner in service of DZRH which celebrates its 85th anniversary celebration in the field of public service.

Our 6-in-1 project was attended by district representatives, namely, PP Josephine Bernabe, Deputy District Secretary; PP Noel Cuico, Chair, District Service Projects; PP Rachel Enriquez, Vice Chair, District Service Projects; PP Lei Evangelista, Vice Chair, Maternal and Child Health; PP Wenifred Tan, Vice Chair, Water and Sanitation; Assistant Governor Roland Cardinoza, Spouse May Cardinoza, and Irresistible Presidents Rhyme Enriquez, and Angelo Aguiling of RC Marikina East and RC Marikina Heights, respectively.

The 6-in-1 project is a testament to the power of collaboration and community engagement. Through our club's strategic partnerships with healthcare providers, local authorities, and dedicated volunteers, a network of support and collaboration was woven, reaching even to the most marginalized families in Barangay Silangan. This unified approach ensured that no one is left behind, embodying the spirit of inclusivity and compassion. Pointedly, all members of the family had the opportunity to avail of free services in that project.


One of the key pillars of this project was promotion of preventive care. The "Oplan Goodbye Bulate" (with 100 children-beneficiaries), "Buntis Mahalaga Ka, Bakuna Huwag Ipagbahala" (with 100 pregnant womenbeneficiaries), "Buto ay Pagtibayin, Katawan ay Palakasin" (with 150 adult-beneficiaries), and "Tayo Naman! Men's Health Awareness" (with 20 male beneficiaries) offered quick assessments, vaccinations, and health education sessions in which families in general were empowered to take charge of their well-being proactively. These projects emphasis on disease prevention not only reduced the burden on healthcare facilities but also fostered a culture of health consciousness within our community.

Furthermore, the 6-in-1 project likewise addressed the multi-faceted nature of health by incorporating massage health services into its framework through the "Restore your Body and Mind with Therapeutic Touch" (with 150 adult beneficiaries). Recognizing the importance of mind and body harmony, therapists were on hand to provide relaxation and comfort to those in need. This holistic approach underscored the project's objective to promote health in its entirety, acknowledging the interconnectedness of physical and mental well-being.



Beyond healthcare services, the project also prioritized nutritional support to 150 children-beneficiaries. The "Feeding Our Future" emphasized the Department of Health's "Pinggang Pinoy, a healthy plate guide for all Filipinos from different age groups. Through a quick information guide on healthy eating habits and the distribution of nutritious foods, families were equipped with the knowledge necessary to lead healthier lives. This comprehensive approach not only improved individual health outcomes but also contributed to the overall vitality of the community.

As the 6-in-1 Health Service Project culminated, its impact reverberated throughout the community we serve. The magic of Rotary was palpable! As we evaluated the project, we knew that families stand stronger and healthier, armed with the tools to navigate life's challenges with resilience. Our project stands as a testament to what can be achieved when communities come together with a shared vision of well-being and prosperity. It leaves not just healthier families but also a blueprint for future initiatives to follow.





Report on Typhoon Carina Relief Operations

Typhoon Carina brought significant challenges to many communities, particularly in Marikina, San Mateo, and Montalban. In response to the urgent needs of the affected areas, AG Rachelle and L immediately initiated a fundraising drive to support relief operations. We started the drive at 1 pm on 24 July 2024, and in less than two hours, we already generated Php 53,000. In less than eight hours, the total donation reached Php 154,000. In the end, we raised a cash total of Php 236,188. plus in-kind donations. These resources enabled us to extend our support to other affected areas like Malabon, Mandaluyong, and Lower Antipolo.

With the approval of Gov. Bobby Zamora. we now formally provide our report.

Feeding Program

Given the urgency of the situation, we quickly mobilized a feeding program to provide hot meals and other food items to evacuees. When the rain stopped, we immediately served approximately 5,000 individuals across various evacuation centers, including Sto. Niño Elementary School and Concepcion Elementary School in Marikina; San Rafael Elementary School in Montalban; and Maly Elementary School in San Mateo, Rizal. Simultaneously, we distributed cooked foods such as siopao and lugaw, with bottled water and other basic commodities.

District Calamity Fund

In view of the government's declaration of State of Calamity in Metro Manila and Rizal Province, RI District 3800, led by District Governor Bobby Zamora, approved the immediate release of ₱100,000 from the District Calamity Fund.

Each of the 10 Zones in D3800 was allocated ₱10,000 for their respective relief operations. The Calamity Management Committee (CMC), led by PP Elmer Espiritu, managed the fund disbursement, while Service Project Chair Noel Cuico facilitated the fund release. Zones 7 and 8, which were less affected by Typhoon Carina, donated their allocations to Zone 4.

Grateful, Zone 4 utilized the donated fund in purchasing stuffs for hygiene kits. Zone 4 produced 600 kits which were distributed to the affected areas, including Brgy. Tumana in Marikina, Brgy. Maly in San Mateo, and Brgys. Burgos and Balite in Montalban, Rizal.











Distribution of Relief Goods

Our top priority then was to distribute essential items to those in need. Throughout the operations, we provided food packs, cupcakes, bottled water, hygiene kits, clothes, pillows, comforters, groceries, medicines and other essentials to affected individuals. The distribution reached several locations, to wit:

Marikina: approximately 20,000 individuals and 2,000 families;

San Mateo: around 10,000 individuals and an additional 1,200 families.; and

Montalban: about 10,000 individuals and 1,500 families.

These efforts ensured that critical supplies were delivered quickly to those most affected by the disaster.





Medical Assistance

In addition to foods and supplies, we provided much-needed medical assistance to evacuues. Our team offered first aid services and medical consultations to 600 individuals, with our Rotarian doctors and nurses conducting free consultations in Brgy. Tumana in Marikina, Brgy. San Rafael in Montalban Rizal, and in Bendia, Brgy. Maly, San Mateo, Rizal.

Challenges

The operation faced several challenges, including impassable roads, shortages of supplies, power outages, weak internet connection and lack of volunteers. However, the resilience and determination of our Rotarians, volunteers, and partners in service allowed us to overcome those obstacles and continue providing essential services to those in need.



The relief operations during Typhoon Carina had a profound impact on the affected communities. The quick distribution of aids, massive feeding programs, and free medical assistance provided immediate relief to thousands of affected individuals and families. Additionally, with the use of sky hydrants, ordinary water was made potable, supporting the basic needs of those affected. Indeed, the generous donations from Rotarians and the dedicated efforts of our volunteers have significantly boosted our response, demonstrating the power of unity in times of crisis
